

## Dr. Lori Boardman

Lori Boardman, MD, ScM, is the Chief Medical Officer and Executive Medical Director of the Florida Hospital for Women and Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Central Florida College of Medicine. A graduate of Columbia University's College of Physicians and Surgeons, she completed her training in Obstetrics and Gynecology at Women and Infants' Hospital of Rhode Island/Brown University. Following residency, she joined the Department of Ob/Gyn at Women and Infants and in 2005, became the Clinical Care Director for the Brown University National Center of Excellence in Women's Health designated by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. In this role, she oversaw the development of a clinical program targeting underserved and unserved women in a large primary care setting with over 35,000 annual patient visits. Clinically, she served as the Director of the Colposcopy Clinic and founded that Center for Vulvovaginal Disorders at Women and Infants' Hospital.

In 2008, she moved to the University of Central Florida College of Medicine, became the Founding Assistant Dean of Medical Education and served as Director of the Gender-Based Medicine curriculum. Outside of her clinical and educational roles, she has published over 80 peer-reviewed publications and book chapters, received funding from the National Institutes of Health (NICHD and NCI), and has been involved in the development of national guidelines for both cervical and breast cancer screening as well as vulvar pain syndromes. Dr. Boardman has served as a member of the Editorial Board of *Obstetrics and Gynecology*, as Vice Chair of the ACOG Practice Bulletin (Gynecology) Committee, and as a Member of the Board of Directors of the American Society for Colposcopy and Cervical Pathology. She currently serves as Vice Chair of the ACOG Committee on Gynecologic Practice and on the American College of Radiology's Appropriateness Criteria Guidelines panel on *Staging and Follow-up of Vaginal Cancer*.

In late 2014, Dr. Boardman moved to AdventHealth (formerly, Florida Hospital) and has focused her efforts in building a comprehensive program in women's health. As the CMO for AdventHealth for Women, Dr. Boardman and her team have developed a collaborative Ob Hospitalist program as well as a multidisciplinary integrated pelvic health program. A focus on quality improvement has also been possible through these efforts. For example, leveraging the OB hospitalists (hired to improve patient safety and act as change agents in clinical care transformation), actively collaborating with providers, creating a multidisciplinary performance review committee, and designing and launching numerous obstetric initiatives have resulted in an 11% decrease in the cesarean delivery rate and a 310% increase in the VBAC while maintaining or improving patient safety goals.
